MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

GENERAL

The following discussion and analysis is based on our results of operations and financial position and should be read in conjunction with the Company's condensed consolidated financial statements and notes for the nine months ended June 30, 2013.

As of the date of this MD&A, the Company has interests in two properties: Golden Arrow and Kinsley Mountain, in which Pilot has earned an approximate 80% interest. Kinsley Mountain is subject to a mining lease agreement with an affiliate, NSL.

All direct costs related to the acquisition of resource property interests have been capitalized. The Company is a resource exploration company with no operating cash flow and its level of expenditures is dependent on the sale of equity capital to finance our exploration operations. Therefore, it is difficult to identify any meaningful trends or develop an analysis from its cash flows.

This information for September 30, 2012 has been summarized from our audited financial statements for the year then ended and the information for the nine and three months ended June 30, 2013 and 2012 has been summarized from unaudited condensed consolidated financial statements for each interim period prepared by management. This summary of financial information should only be read in conjunction with our financial statements, including the notes thereto. The Company's financial statements are prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS") and expressed in Canadian dollars. Previously, the Company prepared its interim and Annual Financial Statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles ("GAAP"). See Note 2 of the Consolidated Interim Financial Statements for the period ended June 30, 2013 for a detailed listing of the Company's accounting policies in accordance with IAS 34.

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OVERALL PERFORMANCE AND RESULTS OF OPERATIONS

The Company is in the exploration stage and therefore has no cash flow from operations. Its principal source of liquidity since incorporation has been from the sale and issuance of equity capital.

Nine months ended June 30, 2013

For the nine months ended June 30, 2013, the Company had a loss of \$807,889 or a loss of \$0.01 per share as compared to a loss of \$2,544,614 or \$0.03 per share for the nine months ended June 30, 2012. The decrease in loss of \$1,736,725, is primarily attributable to a decrease of \$557,050 in finance costs related to the conversion of the convertible note in 2012, a decrease of \$784,892 in exploration costs related to the completion of Company's drill program at its Golden Arrow property, a decrease of \$429,599 in share-based compensation related to option grants to our employees, officers and directors, a decrease of \$12,776 in rent and office costs due to improved cost management, a decrease of \$44,987 in loss on foreign exchange loss due to the fluctuation of the US Dollar and Canadian Dollar conversion rate and a decrease in interest expense of \$20,485 due to the conversion of the convertible note payable in 2012; partially offset by an increase an increase in consulting costs of \$119,184 related primarily to the retention of a corporate finance consultant.

Three months ended June 30, 2013

For the three months ended June 30, 2013, The Company had a loss of \$251,437 or a loss of \$0.00 per share as compared to a loss of \$1,034,255 or \$0.01 per share for the three months ended June 30, 2012. The decrease in loss, \$782,818, is primarily attributable to a decrease of \$142,346 in finance costs related to the conversion of the convertible note in 2012, a decrease of \$530,830 in exploration costs related to the completion of the Company's drill program at its Golden Arrow property, a decrease of \$137,863 in share-based compensation related to option grants to its employees, officers and directors and a decrease of \$14,325 in professional fees due primarily to the work done by the external accountants related to the Company's IFRS conversion, and a decrease of \$24,298 in loss on foreign exchange loss due to the fluctuation of the US Dollar and Canadian Dollar conversion rate; partially offset by an increase of \$75,307 in consulting costs related primarily to the retention of a corporate finance consultant.

LIQUIDITY AND CAPITAL RESOURCES

We are in the exploration stage and therefore have no cash flow from operations. Our principal source of liquidity since incorporation has been from the sale and issuance of equity capital. From the date of our incorporation on April 3, 2007 to June 30, 2013, we have raised approximately \$11 million in net proceeds from the sale of equity capital for cash. At June 30, 2013 we had 96,673,175 Common Shares outstanding.

A description of the financing transactions for the periods ended September 30, 2012 and June 3, 2013 is included in this MD&A in its section "Financing Activities."

At June 30, 2013 current assets were \$505,131 and current liabilities were \$40,319 resulting in working capital of \$464,812.

For the Nine Months Ended June 30, 2013 Containing information up to and including August 26, 2013

FINANCING ACTIVITIES

At June 30, 2013 we had total assets of \$3,205,386. Our principal assets are cash of \$281,674 and our mineral exploration and evaluation property interests in Nevada. As at June 30, 2013 we had total capitalized expenditures of \$2,680,068 related to these properties. During the year ended September 30, 2012 the Golden Arrow property was the subject of an exploration program, and the company continues to evaluate the results. Through June 30, 2013, the Company has spent a total of \$2,567,295 on the exploration of the Golden Arrow property that has been recorded as exploration costs.

At June 30, 2013 our capital stock was \$11,442,253 with 96,673,175 common shares issued and outstanding. We also had \$1,567,174 in contributed reserves primarily associated with the fair value of warrants granted to our agent in connection with our financings and the fair value of stock options vesting during the year. As of June 30, 2013 there was an accumulated deficit of \$9,984,796.

In April 2012, the Company converted an outstanding US\$290,000 convertible note payable to Ernesto Echavarria, which was convertible at the option of Echavarria, into 4,142,858 Units. Each Unit consisted of one common share of the Company and one-half of one common share purchase warrant. Each whole warrant entitled Echavarria to acquire an additional common share at an exercise price of \$0.12 exercisable until March 25, 2013. The warrants expired unexercised. In addition, Echavarria was paid accrued interest of \$953.

In March 2012, the Company completed three separate private placements as follows:

The Company completed a non-brokered private placement of 2,857,140 units (the "Units") at a price of \$0.07 per Unit. Each Unit consisted of one common share of the Company (a "Share") and one common share purchase warrant (a "Warrant"). Each whole Warrant entitles the holder to purchase an additional common share (a "Warrant Share") at an exercise price of \$0.10 per Warrant Share until March 16, 2014.

The Company completed a private placement, of units (the "Units") at a price of \$0.12 per Unit (the "Offering"). A total of 16,700,000 Units were issued, for total proceeds of \$2,004,000. Each Unit consisted of one common share of the Company (a "Share") and one half of one common share purchase warrant (a "Warrant"). Each whole Warrant entitles the holder to purchase an additional common share (a "Warrant Share") at an exercise price of \$0.20 per Warrant Share for a period of 24 months from the date of issuance, subject to earlier expiry at any time after four months and one day from the date of issuance, at the option of the Company, if the daily volume weighted average price of the common shares of the Company may accelerate the expiry date of the Warrants by giving notice to the holders thereof and in such case the Warrants will expire on the 30th day after the date on which such notice is given by the Company. In consideration for the services provided by the Agent, the Company issued to the Agent 1,586,667 Units, which consisted of one share and one half of one share purchase warrant. Each full share purchase warrant is exercisable at \$0.20 per share. Proceeds from the Offering will be used to fund the exploration of the Company's North American precious metals properties and as general working capital.

The Company also completed a non-brokered private placement. The Company issued 6,250,000 Units, (the "Units") at a price of \$0.12 per Unit. Each Unit consisted of one common share of the Company (a "Share") and one-half of one common share purchase warrant (a "Warrant"). Each whole Warrant will entitle the holder to purchase an additional common share (a "Warrant Share") at an exercise price of \$0.20 per Warrant Share for a period expiring March 23, 2014. If the Company's common shares trade at a daily volume weighted average price of greater than \$0.32 per share for a period of 20 consecutive trading days at any time after four months and one day after the closing, the Company may accelerate the expiry date of the Warrants by giving notice to the holders notice thereof and in such case the Warrants will expire on the 30th day after the date on which such notice is given by the Company. The securities issued in the private placement is subject to a four month hold period which expired July 24, 2012.

The proceeds from the financings noted above, as well as those financings which were completed in the past, have been our principal source of funds.

Investing Activities

During the nine months ended June 30, 2013, we incurred exploration and evaluation asset acquisition costs related to our Pinnacle property in Nevada of \$18,704. The Pinnacle property minimum royalty payment was due to our affiliate, NSL, subject to a mining lease (the "Agreement".) The Company terminated this mining lease in August, 2013.

For the nine months ended June 30, 2013, the Company incurred exploration and evaluation acquisition costs related to all of its mineral property interests in Nevada of \$35,570. The Company's ability to continue as a going concern is dependent upon its ability to raise additional capital, and achieve profitability, to fund any additional losses it may incur. The Company will have an obligation to fund ("Cash Call") the cost of operating the Kinsley Mountain property to the extent of its interest. The formation of a joint venture with Pilot for the Kinsley Mountain property is pending. The Company has notified Pilot it will not participate in the initial program and budget for 2013. As a result of this election, the Company's expects its interest in the pending Kinsley Mountain joint venture with Pilot to be approximately 20%. There is no assurance the Company will be able to raise the required capital necessary to meet any future cash calls. The Company's interim financial statements were prepared on a going concern basis, which implies that it will realize its assets and discharge its liabilities in the normal course of business. The condensed consolidated financial statements do not reflect adjustments to the carrying value of assets and liabilities that would be necessary if the Company is unable to achieve and maintain profitable operations.

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SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

The Company's Chief Financial Officer, Mike Tomczak, submitted his resignation effective the end of August, 2013. The Company will name a successor at a later date.

In August, 2013 the Company gave notice to its affiliate terminating its lease for the Pinnacle property.

Effective August 13, 2013, the Company named its Chairman of the Board, Warren Stanyer, as its interim Chief Executive Officer ("CEO") to replace the current CEO, William Henderson. Henderson will assist Stanyer with the transition.

The Company has informed its partner for the Kinsley Mountain Property (the "Property"), Pilot that it will not participate in the 2013 work program for that property. As a result of this election, the Company's expects its interest in the pending Kinsley Mountain joint venture with Pilot to be approximately 20%. In addition, Pilot has agreed to reimburse to the Company the amount it has been paid of \$216,053 which has been included as prepaid property costs on the Company's condensed consolidated statements of financial position as at June 30, 2013. The Company and Pilot continue to negotiate a joint venture agreement to govern operations on the project. **COMMITMENT**

The Company has entered into an operating lease agreement and amendments for its office premises in Auburn, California, which runs through December 2014. The annual commitments under this lease are as follows:

The Company also had mining lease agreements with NSL, for the Iron Point and Juniper properties. The lease agreements were terminated effective June 1, 2011 and all related acquisition costs have been expensed.

The Company is actively seeking financing which will allow the Company to meet its ongoing obligations, including the royalty payments required pursuant to its mining lease agreements and a potential obligation to fund the its share of costs related to the relationship it has with the optionee and operator, Pilot, in regard to the exploration of the Kinsley Mountain property. A joint venture has not been formed, both parties are working to finalize an agreement, however, the Company paid Pilot a total of USD\$205,472 in escrow to satisfy to help fund the operating costs at the Kinsley Mountain property through June 30, 2013. Since the Company has notified Pilot of its intention to not participate in the 2013 work program, Pilot has agreed to reimburse this amount. As a result of its decision to not participate in the 2013 work program, the Company's remaining interest in the Kinsley Mountain project is approximately 20%. To fund any future potential share of its costs, will require the Company raising additional capital, however, there can be no assurance that the Company's efforts will be successful.

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RISK FACTORS

Limited Operating History

We have no history of earnings. Our properties are in the exploration stage and there are no known commercially mineable mineral deposits on our properties.

Negative Cash Flow

To date, we have experienced negative operating cash flow and have not recorded any revenues from mining operations. None of our properties have advanced to the commercial production stage and we have no history of earnings or cash flow from operations. There can be no assurance that significant additional losses will not occur in the near future or that we will be profitable in the future. Our operating expenses and capital expenditures may increase in subsequent years as needed consultants, personnel and equipment associated with advancing exploration, development and potentially commercial production of our properties are added. The amounts and timing of expenditures will depend on the progress of ongoing exploration and development, the results of consultants' analyses and recommendations, the rate at which operating losses are incurred, the execution of any joint venture agreements with strategic partners, the acquisition of additional properties and other factors, many of which are beyond our control. We expect to continue to incur losses unless and until such time as our properties enter into commercial production and generate sufficient revenues to fund continuing operations. The development of our properties will require the commitment of substantial resources to conduct the time-consuming exploration and development of properties. There can be no assurance that we will generate any revenues or achieve profitability. There can be no assurance that the underlying assumed levels of expenses will prove to be accurate. We have paid no dividends on our Common Shares since incorporation and do not anticipate doing so for the foreseeable future. Historically, the only source of funds available to us has been through the sale of our equity securities and through the option or joint venture of our projects. Any future additional equity financing would cause dilution to current shareholders. The option, sale or joint venture of our projects could also result in dilution of our interest or loss of, the project optioned, sold or joint ventured. If we do not have sufficient capital for our operations, it could result in delay or indefinite postponement of further exploration or development of the properties or loss of mineral claims, which would have a negative effect on our securities.

Title Risks

Although we have exercised due diligence with respect to determining title to the properties in which we have a material interest, there is no guarantee that title to such properties will not be challenged or impugned. Our mineral property interests may be subject to prior unregistered agreements or transfers or native land claims and title may be affected by undetected defects. Surveys have not been carried out on any of our mineral properties in accordance with the laws of the jurisdiction in which such properties are situated; therefore, their existence and area could be in doubt. Until competing interests in the mineral lands have been determined, we can give no assurance as to the validity of our title to those lands or the size of such mineral lands.

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Exploration and Development

Resource exploration and development is a speculative business, characterized by a number of significant risks including, among other things, unprofitable efforts resulting not only from the failure to discover mineral deposits but also from finding mineral deposits that, though present, are insufficient in quantity and quality to return a profit from production. The marketability of minerals we acquire or discover may be affected by numerous factors that are beyond our control and that cannot be accurately predicted, such as market fluctuations, the proximity and capacity of milling facilities, mineral markets and processing equipment, and such other factors as government regulations, including regulations relating to royalties, allowable production, the import and export of minerals and environmental protection, the combination of which factors may result in the Corporation not receiving an adequate return of investment capital.

All of the claims in which we have acquired or have a right to acquire an interest are in the exploration stage only and are without a known commercially-mineable ore body. Development of the subject mineral properties would follow only if favorable exploration results are obtained.

There is no assurance that our mineral exploration and development activities will result in any discoveries of commercial bodies of ore. The long-term profitability of our operations will in part be directly related to the costs and success of its exploration programs, which may be affected by a number of factors.

Substantial expenditures are required to establish reserves through drilling and to develop the mining and processing facilities and infrastructure at any site chosen for mining. Although substantial benefits may be derived from the discovery of a major mineralized deposit, no assurance can be given that minerals will be discovered in sufficient quantities to justify commercial operations or that funds required for development can be obtained on a timely basis.

Uninsurable Risks

Exploration, development and production of mineral properties is subject to certain risks, and in particular, unexpected or unusual geological operating conditions including rock bursts, cave-ins, fires, flooding and earthquakes may occur. It is not always possible to insure fully against such risks and we may decide not to take out insurance against such risks as a result of high premiums or for other reasons. Should such liabilities arise, they could have an adverse impact on our operations and could reduce or eliminate any future profitability and result in increasing costs and a decline in the value of the securities of the Corporation.

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Environmental Regulations, Permits and Licenses

Our operations may be subject to environmental regulations promulgated by government agencies from time to time. Environmental legislation provides for restrictions and prohibitions on spills, releases or emissions of various substances produced in association with certain mining industry operations, such as seepage from tailings disposal areas, which would result in environmental pollution. A breach of such legislation may result in the imposition of fines and penalties. In addition, certain types of operations require the submission and approval of environmental impact assessments. Environmental legislation is evolving in a manner that means standards are stricter, and enforcement, fines and penalties for noncompliance are more stringent. Environmental assessments of proposed projects carry a heightened degree of responsibility for companies and directors, officers and employees. The cost of compliance with changes in governmental regulations has a potential to reduce the profitability of operations. We intend to comply fully with all environmental regulations.

Our current or future operations, including development activities and commencement of production on our properties, require permits from various federal, state or territorial and local governmental authorities, and such operations are and will be governed by laws and regulations governing prospecting, development, mining, production, exports, taxes, labor standards, occupational health, waste disposal, toxic substances, land use, environmental protection, mine safety and other matters.

Such operations and exploration activities are also subject to substantial regulation under applicable laws by governmental agencies that may require that we obtain permits from various governmental agencies. There can be no assurance, however, that all permits that we may require for our operations and exploration activities will be obtainable on reasonable terms or on a timely basis or that such laws and regulations will not have an adverse effect on any mining project which we might undertake.

Failure to comply with applicable laws, regulations, and permitting requirements may result in enforcement actions thereunder, including orders issued by regulatory or judicial authorities causing operations to cease or be curtailed, and may include corrective measures requiring capital expenditures, installation of additional equipment, or remedial actions. Parties engaged in mining operations may be required to compensate those suffering loss or damage by reason of mining activities and may have civil or criminal fines or penalties imposed for violations of applicable laws or regulations and, in particular, environmental laws.

Amendments to current laws, regulations and permits governing operations and activities of mining companies, or more stringent implementation thereof, could have a material adverse impact on the Company and cause increases in capital expenditures or production costs or reduction in levels of production at producing properties or require abandonment or delays in development of new mining properties.

To the best of our knowledge, we are operating in compliance with all applicable rules and regulations.

Competition

The mining industry is intensely competitive in all its phases, and we compete with other companies that have greater financial and technical resources. Competition could adversely affect our ability to acquire suitable properties or prospects in the future.

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Management

Our success is currently largely dependent on the performance of our directors and officers. There is no assurance we will be able to maintain the services of our directors and officers or other qualified personnel required to operate its business. The loss of the services of these persons could have a material adverse affect on the Corporation and our prospects.

Fluctuating Mineral Prices

Factors beyond our control may affect the marketability of metals discovered, if any. Metal prices have fluctuated widely, particularly in recent years. The effect of these factors on our operations cannot be predicted.

Gold Price

Our profitability will be linked to the price of gold as our revenues, if any, will be derived primarily from gold mining. Gold prices are affected by numerous factors beyond our control, including central bank sales, producer hedging activities, the relative exchange rate of the U.S. dollar with other major currencies, global and regional demand and political and economic conditions. Worldwide gold production levels also affect gold prices. In addition, the price of gold has on occasion been subject to rapid short-term changes due to speculative activities.

Future Financings

Our continued operation will be dependent upon our ability to generate operating revenues and to procure additional financing. There can be no assurance that any such revenues can be generated or that other financing can be obtained on acceptable terms. Failure to obtain additional financing on a timely basis may cause us to postpone development plans, forfeit rights in some or all of our properties or joint ventures, or reduce or terminate some or all of our operations. If available, future equity financing may result in substantial dilution to current shareholders.

Further Acquisitions

As part of the our business strategy, we may seek to grow by acquiring companies, assets or establishing joint ventures that we believes will complement our current or future business. We may not effectively select acquisition candidates or negotiate or finance acquisitions or integrate the acquired businesses and their personnel or acquire assets for its business. We cannot guarantee that we will complete any acquisition on favourable terms, or that any acquisitions completed will ultimately benefit our business. Future acquisitions may result in substantial dilution to current shareholders.

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Price Volatility of Publicly Traded Securities

In recent years, the securities markets in the United States and Canada have experienced a high level of price and volume volatility, and the market prices of securities of many companies have experienced wide fluctuations in price that have not necessarily been related to the operating performance, underlying asset values or prospects of such companies. There can be no assurance that continual fluctuations in price will not occur. It may be anticipated that any quoted market for the Common Shares will be subject to market trends and conditions generally, notwithstanding any potential success of the Corporation in creating revenues, cash flows or earnings. The value of securities distributed hereunder will be affected by market volatility.

If an active public market for the Common Shares does not develop or is not sustained, the liquidity of a shareholder's investment may be limited and the share price may decline below their purchase price.

Foreign Currency Exchange

Exchange rate fluctuations may affect the costs that we incur in our operations. Our financing activities have been denominated in Canadian dollars, while the expenditures we will incur on our mineral exploration projects in the United States will be denominated in U.S. dollars. The appreciation of the US dollar against the Canadian dollar, if it occurs, would result in increased costs of our activities in the United States in Canadian dollar terms, and currency movements may have a significant impact on our financial position and results of operations in the future.

Conflicts of Interest

Some of our directors and officers are engaged and will continue to be engaged in the search for additional business opportunities on behalf of other companies, and situations may arise where these directors and officers will be in direct competition with the Corporation. In particular, William Henderson, our Chief Executive Officer and one of our directors, is managing director of and holds a minority ownership interest in NSL. We hold rights in our Kinsley Mountain property through an option agreement with NSL. Conflicts will be dealt with in accordance with the relevant provisions of the British Columbia Business Corporations Act.

Dividends

We have not paid any dividends on our Common Shares since incorporation and do not anticipate paying any dividends on its Common Shares in the foreseeable future.

FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The fair value of the Company's due from related parties, other current assets, accounts payable and accrued liabilities, and due to related parties approximate their carrying value, because of the short-term nature of these instruments.

The Company's risk exposures and the impact on the Company's financial instruments are summarized below:

Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk of loss associated with counterparty's inability to fulfill its payment obligations. The Company's management believes it has no significant credit risk.

Liquidity risk

The Company's approach to managing liquidity risk is to ensure that it will have sufficient liquidity to meet liabilities when due. As at June 30, 2013, the Company had a cash balance of \$281,674 (September 30, 2012 - \$1,013,031) to settle current liabilities of \$40,319 (September 30, 2012 - \$33,919).

Market risk

Market risk is the risk of loss that may arise from changes in market factors such as interest rates, foreign exchange rates, and commodity and equity prices.

a) Interest rate risk

The Company has cash balances. The Company is not at a significant risk to fluctuating interest rates. The Company's current policy is to invest excess cash in investment-grade short-term deposit certificates issued by its banking institutions or short-term debt instruments issued by the federal government. The Company periodically monitors the investments it makes and is satisfied with the credit ratings of its banks. As of June 30, 2013 and September 30, 2012, the Company did not have any investments in investment-grade short-term deposit certificates or short-term debt issued by the federal government.

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b) Foreign currency risk

The Company is exposed to foreign currency risk on fluctuations related to cash and accounts payable, accrued liabilities, and convertible note payable that are denominated in US Dollars or Canadian Dollars and will be converted to the other currency.

c) Price risk

The Company is exposed to price risk with respect to commodity and equity prices. Equity price risk is defined as the potential adverse impact on the Company's earnings due to movements in individual equity prices or general movements in the level of the stock market. Commodity price risk is defined as the potential adverse impact on earnings and economic value due to commodity price movements and volatilities. The Company closely monitors commodity prices of gold, individual equity movements, and the stock market to determine the appropriate course of action to be taken by the Company.

Sensitivity Analysis

The Company operates in the United States and is exposed to risk from changes in the US dollar. A 10% fluctuation in the US dollar against the Canadian dollar would affect net loss for the nine months ended June 30, 2013 by approximately \$80,789.

CRITICAL ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES

Significant assumptions about the future and other sources of estimation uncertainty that management has made at the end of the reporting period, that could result in a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the event that actual results differ from assumptions made, relate to, but are not limited to, the following:

i) Exploration and evaluation assets

The carrying value and the recoverability of exploration and evaluation assets, which are included in the statements of financial position. At every reporting period, management assesses the potential impairment which involves assessing whether or not facts or circumstances exist that suggests the carrying amount exceeds the recoverable amount.

ii) Share-based payments

The inputs used in calculating the fair value for share-based payments expense included in profit or loss and share-based share issuance costs included in equity. The share-based payments expense is estimated using the Black-Scholes options-pricing model as measured on the grant date to estimate the fair value of stock options. This model involves the input of highly subjective assumptions, including the expected price volatility of the Company's common shares, the expected life of the options, and the estimated forfeiture rate.

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iii) Income taxes

The estimation of income taxes includes evaluating the recoverability of deferred tax assets based on an assessment of the Company's ability to utilize the underlying future tax deductions against future taxable income prior to expiry of those deductions. Management assesses whether it is probable that some or all of the deferred income tax assets will not be realized. The ultimate realization of deferred tax assets is dependent upon the generation of future taxable income, which in turn is dependent upon the successful discovery, extraction, development and commercialization of mineral reserves. To the extent that management's assessment of the Company's ability to utilize future tax deductions changes, the Company would be required to recognize more or fewer deferred tax assets, and future income tax provisions or recoveries could be affected.

Critical Judgments

i) The preparation of our financial statements require management to make judgments regarding the going concern of the Company. As at June 30, 2013 the Company had a working capital of \$464,812. Management's judgment is that the Company has sufficient working capital to cover its obligations as they come due over the next twelve months.

Tax Positions

The Company from time-to-time may be required to support certain of its tax filing positions with the tax authorities of the federal and local governments under which the Company operates ("Tax Authority"). If the Company does not receive a favorable ruling from a Tax Authority on these positions it may be required to file delinquent or to file amended tax returns. This may result in the Company owing the Tax Authority taxes, penalties and interest, in addition, certain shareholders may be subject to withholding which may be due. There is no assurance the Company will have adequate financial resources to pay any tax, penalty or interest which may be due a Tax Authority.

ADDITIONAL DISCLOSURE FOR COMPANIES WITHOUT SIGNIFICANT REVENUE

Our consolidated financial statements, included herein, have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards assuming the Company will continue on a going-concern basis. The Company has incurred losses since inception and the ability of the Company to continue as a going-concern depends upon its ability to develop profitable operations and to continue to raise adequate financing.

The Company continues to actively target additional sources of financing which Management believes will assure the continuation of the Company's operations and exploration programs. In order for the Company to continue to meet its liabilities as they come due and to continue its operations, the Company is solely dependent upon its ability to generate such financing.

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There can be no assurance that the Company will be able to continue to raise funds in which case the Company may be unable to meet its obligations including any potential obligations as a result of a potential obligation to fund the its share of costs for the Kinsley Mountain property related to the relationship it has with the optionee and operator, Pilot. The formation of a joint venture is pending. The Kinsley Mountain Property is collateral for payment of these obligations. The Company has notified Pilot it will not participate in the initial program and budget for 2013. As a result of this election, the Company's expects its interest in the pending Kinsley Mountain joint venture with Pilot to be approximately 20%. To fund any potential costs associated with the Kinsley Mountain property will require the Company raising additional capital there is no assurance the Company will be able to raise this capital. Should the Company be unable to realize on its assets and discharge its liabilities in the normal course of business, the net realizable value of its assets may be materially less than the amounts recorded on the balance sheets. Our financial statements do not include adjustments to amounts and classifications of assets and liabilities that might be necessary should the Company be unable to continue operations.

The current market conditions and volatility increase the uncertainty of the Company's ability to continue as a going concern given the need to both curtail expenditures and to raise additional funds. The Company is experiencing, and has experienced, negative operating cash flows. The Company will continue to search for new or alternate sources of financing but anticipates that the current market conditions may impact the ability to source such funds.

Our financial statements provide a detailed breakdown of various expenses we incurred. Our expenses are relatively basic, including accounting, audit and legal fees, bank charges, and office and miscellaneous. Share-based compensation expenses have decreased significantly during the year as a result of a stock option grant to our directors and officers in March 2012, the stock options vested immediately. Our consulting costs also increased due primarily to the retention of a corporate finance consultant. Finance costs decreased significantly due to the conversion of our convertible note payable. Also, exploration costs have decreased due to the completion of our drill program at our Golden Arrow property, as announced by the Company in October, 2012. Details for these expenditures may be found in the statement of loss and comprehensive loss included in the condensed financial statements for the nine months ended June 30, 2013.

BUSINESS OBJECTIVES

Our only business at present is the exploration and development of our properties. Our primary shortterm objective is to complete the work program on our Golden Arrow property. Our future work at the Golden Arrow property will be based upon our better understanding of this property from the work to date. We will also evaluate our partner's, Pilot, development of our other property, Kinsley Mountain. In addition, we will evaluate other properties for acquisition and joint venture potential. We will require additional funds obtained from additional financing for any new programs.

DISCLOSURE OF OUTSTANDING SHARE DATA

We have one class of shares, being the Common Shares without par value. As at the date of this MD&A, 96,673,175 Common Shares were issued and outstanding. At the same date, there were outstanding a total of 15,125,472 common share purchase warrants, each exercisable for one Common share.
